INVISIBLE CHILD: POVERTY, SURVIVAL & HOPE IN AN AMERICAN CITY 9:30 – 10:30 AM | Breakout Session | Venue TBD

Dasani. Do you remember that name? She became the poster child for how poverty, race, and the moral failings of our institutions impact the most marginal among us, in particular, one poor Black child in New York. She first came to our attention in the pages of *The New York Times* due to investigative reporter **ANDREA ELLIOTT**'s extraordinary, detailed, and dogged efforts. Dasani's story became the basis of Elliott's 2022 Pulitzer Prize-winning book, *Invisible Child*, as eye-opening as it is heartbreaking. In conversation with another Pulitzer Prize-winning novelist and playwright **AYAD AKHTAR**, Elliott will tell us about Dasani's life and how it is both singular and emblematic, and talk about her own passions for the deeply immersive journalism that is the hallmark of her professional life.

Author **DAVID GRANN**, who originally wrote about Worsley for *The New Yorker*, will be in conversation with novelist and screenwriter **JOHN BURNHAM SCHWARTZ**, who is one of the writers of the Apple TV show, starring Tom Hiddleston, that is currently being made of Grann's book *The White Darkness*. The conversation will open a window into Grann's writing process, both investigative and imaginative.

In conversation with **ANNE TAYLOR FLEMING**, Hunt and Woodruff will reflect on the state of journalism and its fundamental place in any democracy and share some hopeful, inspiring stories of reporters—many of them women now—who are doing brave and amazing work to bring us the stories we need to hear.
