HARRIET TUBMAN AND THE FAITH DREAMS OF A FREE PEOPLE 12:30 – 1:30 PM | BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

Harriet Tubman is among the most famous Americans ever born and soon to be the face of the twenty-dollar bill. Yet often she's a figure more out of myth than history, almost a comic-book superhero. Despite being barely five feet tall, unable to read, and suffering from a brain injury, Tubman managed to escape from her enslavement; return again and again to lead others north to freedom without loss of life; speak out powerfully against slavery; and then become the first American woman in history to lead a military raid, freeing some seven hundred people. You could almost say she was America's Robin Hood, a miraculous vision, often rightly celebrated but seldom understood. Award-winning historian **TIYA MILES**, the author of two recently published books on Tubman, will show us the real Harriet Tubman behind the myth.

In May 2016, Fort McMurray, the hub of Canada's oil industry and America's biggest foreign supplier, was overrun by wildfire. Through the lens of this apocalyptic conflagration—the wildfire equivalent of Hurricane Katrina—award-winning author **JOHN VAILLANT** warns that this was not a unique event, but a shocking preview of what we must prepare for in a hotter, more flammable world. In his talk—as he did in his book, one of the most critically lauded of the past year—Vaillant will take us on a riveting journey through the intertwined histories of North America's oil industry and the birth of climate science, to the unprecedented devastation wrought by modern forest fires, and into lives forever changed by these disasters.

In 1912, Russia experienced a flowering of liberalism and tolerance that placed it at the forefront of the modern world: women were fighting for the right to vote in the elections for the newly empowered parliament; Russian art and culture were the envy of Europe; and there was a vibrant free press and intellectual life. But a fatal flaw was left uncorrected: Russia's exuberant experimental moment took place atop a rotten foundation. The old imperial order, in place for three hundred years, still held the nation in thrall. Russian journalist **MIKHAIL ZYGAR**, author of the book *The Empire Must Die*, will talk to Pulitzer Prize-winning author **LIAQUAT AHAMED** about how the collapse of the Russian Empire changed the course of the twentieth century and eerily anticipated the mood of the twenty-first and whether democracy can ever exist in modern-day Russia.

This deeply researched book (Eig had access to recently declassified FBI files) is both riveting and moving, a portrait of a leader who changed race relations in this country and thus, the country itself. Eig will talk about King's life and legacy and about why he wrote this book now.

With his magical range and musical ear, Muldoon has written about hedgehogs and cauliflowers, about birth and death, and he will inaugurate our festival with a reading of some of his most beloved poems, including selections from his upcoming collection, *Joy in Service on Rue Tagore*. Margaret Atwood with Ayad Akhtar

MARGARET ATWOOD: WRITER IN THE WORLD 5:15 – 6:15 PM | PAVILION

MARGARET ATWOOD, author of more than 60 books in almost every conceivable genre, recipient of more than 100 literary prizes from around the world, is a global icon. Like Kafka and Orwell before her, she and her writing have become part of the public discourse, wherever we live and whatever our age. Atwood's intelligence is that vital and exacting, her wit that mischievous, her concerns—from birds to the human condition, from environmentalism to feminism, from the lessons of history to social justice—that urgently relevant. She has quoted a Polish resistance fighter from the Second World War who once told her: "Pray that you will never have the occasion to be a hero." As it has turned out, Atwood has indeed had the occasion, not just once, and never has she failed to rise to its challenges. She is our hero. After receiving the 2024 SVWC Writer in the World Prize, Atwood will talk to Pulitzer Prize-winning writer AYAD AKHTAR about her life, her work, and some of the many wonders and terrors of the world we are living in.

INVESTIGATING THE PAST: WRITING THE HISTORICAL NOVEL TODAY 9:00 - 10:00 AM | PAVILION

Hilary Mantel once wrote, "The writer of history is a walking anachronism, using today's techniques to try to know things about yesterday that yesterday didn't know itself. She must try to work authentically, hearing the words of the past, but communicating in a language the present understands. I start to practice my trade at the point where the satisfactions of the official story break down." Three of our most incisive and successful contemporary novelists whose work often engages with history—MAGGIE O'FARRELL, KRISTIN HANNAH, and AYANA MATHIS—will sit down with New York Times columnist and former Book Review editor PAMELA PAUL for a frank discussion about Mantel's observations, their own books, and how and why they write what they do.

Kaveh Akbar and Vinson Cunningham with Anne Taylor Fleming

No two debut novels in 2024 have generated as much unanimous praise and excitement as KAVEH AKBAR's Martyr! and VINSON CUNNINGHAM's Great Expectations. These ambitious, piercingly smart books are both intellectually and emotionally captivating. Martyr! tracks a newly sober son of Iranian immigrants as he embarks on a gritty, hilarious, poignant search for family, guided by the voices of artists, poets and kings. The New York Times Book Review says: "What Akbar pulls off in Martyr! is nothing short of miraculous." In Great Expectations, Cunningham gives us another man on a search, a young, Black college dropout who goes to work on a historical presidential campaign (an unnamed Obama), an autobiographical novel The Washington Post calls "a coming-of-age story that captures the soul of America." In conversation with ANNE TAYLOR FLEMING, Akbar and Cunningham will talk about their books, their writing lives—Akbar is a highly regarded poet and Cunningham is a staff writer and film critic at The New Yorker—and why they have turned to fiction.

Rabbi Sharon Brous with Jeffrey Goldberg

MORAL EARTHQUAKES AND HOW WE TALK ABOUT THEM 10:30 - 11:30 AM | BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

At a time when polarization around the world has never been greater, SHARON BROUS, author and leading American rabbi, will talk with JEFFREY GOLDBERG. editor in chief of The Atlantic, about the extraordinary challenges posed at every level of society—social, familial, individual—by the most difficult and intractable moral issues. How do we begin to talk honestly and effectively with each other, for example, about Israel and Gaza? How do we talk about politics and the monumental election facing us a few months from now? Freedom of speech? Religion, race, gender? As the founding rabbi of IKAR in Los Angeles, one of the most diverse, fastest growing and influential Jewish communities in the nation, Rabbi Brous has spent the last 20 years trying to foster conversations and thoughtfulness that can see us through these seemingly impossible times.

In her brave and buoyant memoir, ALEJANDRA CAMPOVERDI writes about the emotional and literal hurdles she encountered as a first gen Latina breaking a number of generational cycles. Her life has been full of amazing contradictions. Raised on welfare by an immigrant single mother in Los Angeles, Campoverdi has been a White House aide to President Obama and a gang member's girlfriend. She's ridden in stolen cars and on Air Force One and is now a nationally recognized women's health advocate. Campoverdi will talk about her life and the unique challenges faced by "First and Onlys" and share her advice for those following in her footsteps.

Drew Gilpin Faust with Andrea Elliott

DREW GILPIN FAUST: THE EDUCATION OF AN EDUCATOR 10:30 - 11:30 AM | BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

Before becoming an award-winning Civil War historian and the first woman president of Harvard University, **DREW GILPIN FAUST** grew up in conservative, segregated Virginia at a time when a privileged white girl was expected to adopt a willful blindness to the inequities of race and the constraints of gender, an acceptance of female subordination and racial hierarchy that she found intolerable and galvanizing. Faust will talk to Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist ANDREA ELLIOTT about how, during the 1960s, she forged a path of her own—one that would eventually lead her to become a historian and educator deeply engaged with some of the most urgent moral issues of our, or any other, era.

James Shapiro with Ayad Akhtar

THE PLAYBOOK:

A STORY OF THEATER, DEMOCRACY, AND THE MAKING OF A CULTURE WAR 10:30 - 11:30 AM | BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

From 1935 to 1939, the Federal Theatre Project staged over a thousand productions in twenty-nine states that were seen by thirty million (or nearly one in four) Americans, two-thirds of whom had never seen a play before. It employed over twelve thousand struggling artists, some of whom, like Orson Welles and Arthur Miller, would soon be famous, but most of whom were just ordinary people eager to work again. And yet, the Federal Theatre was the first New Deal project to be attacked and ended on the grounds that it promoted "un-American" activity, sowing the seeds not only for the McCarthyism of the 1950s but also for our own era of merciless polarization. Celebrated Shakespeare scholar JAMES SHAPIRO will talk to Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright AYAD AKHTAR about this little-known but important slice of history and what it tells us about the enduring power of the theater as perhaps our most democratic art form.

Given the enormous focus these days on the United States Supreme Court, you will not want to miss retired Supreme Court JUSTICE STEPHEN BREYER's talk about his new book. It offers a clear and brilliant analysis of the difference between the textualist philosophy of the Court's current supermajority and the pragmatism that is Brever's own guiding principle. In a wide-ranging conversation with JEFFREY ROSEN, President and Chief Executive Officer of the National Constitution Center, Breyer will talk about some of the most important cases in the nation's history, including the 2022 Dobbs and Bruen decisions that he believes were wrongly decided and have led to harmful results.

What will it take to mend our broken hearts and rebuild our society in a time of loneliness and isolation, social rupture and alienation? SHARON BROUS, a leading American rabbi, will make the case that it is through honoring our most basic human instinct—the yearning for real connection—that we reawaken our shared humanity and begin to heal. A preacher and storyteller, Brous will pair heart-driven anecdotes from her experience building and pastoring to a leading-edge faith community over the past two decades with ancient Jewish wisdom and contemporary science. Hers is a clarion call: the sense of belonging engendered by our genuine presence is a social and biological need, and a moral and spiritual necessity.

Lehane will talk to PBS NewsHour's JEFFREY BROWN about the book, about Boston and busing, and about what history and fiction, together, can tell us about ourselves.

RUTH REICHL, one of our best-known and well-loved food writers, is the author of five memoirs, including Tender at the Bone and Save Me the Plums. In her delightful new book, the protagonist Stella is left with an unusual inheritance: a one-way plane ticket and a note reading "Go to Paris." But Stella is hardly cut out for adventure; a traumatic childhood has confined her to the strict routines of her comfort zone. Reichl will talk to fellow food writer ALEKSANDRA **CRAPANZANO** about this novel that so entertainingly celebrates the city they both adore, and the many reasons for living deliciously, taking chances, and finding your true home.

Niall Ferguson with Evan Osnos

WHAT WOULD KISSINGER DO? 4:00 - 5:00 PM | PAVILION

No U.S. secretary of state ever achieved such celebrity while in office as Henry Kissinger; immersed in the philosophy of Kant and the diplomacy of Metternich, he was hailed as one of the most important strategic thinkers America has ever produced. Yet no former secretary of state has been more vehemently criticized, most notably for sins of omission and commission in countries such as Bangladesh, Cambodia, Chile, and East Timor. Renowned historian NIALL FERGUSON, now completing the second of his two-volume biography of Kissinger, talks to journalist EVAN OSNOS about his subject's complicated legacy and, casting a hard eye at current crises around the world, considers what Kissinger might have made of our current foreign policy landscape.

How does a guy who swore repeatedly that he would never write about the Civil War end up writing a book about the Civil War? The book is a political horror story that captures the forces that led America to the brink—a dark reminder that we often don't see a cataclysm coming until it's too late.

The Lyrics is a captivating look at creativity, where it springs from, and how it works. Join Muldoon as he talks about the book and how he came to be involved with it, and the storytelling genius of one of our greatest songwriters.

Maggie O'Farrell and James Shapiro with John Burnham Schwartz

HOW AND WHY SHAKESPEARE MATTERS TODAY 1:30 - 2:30 PM | BREAKOUT SESSION | VENUE TBD

MAGGIE O'FARRELL's prize-winning, heartbreaking novel Hamnet imagines the emotional, domestic, and artistic repercussions after William Shakespeare and his wife lose their only son, 11-year-old Hamnet, to the bubonic plague in 1596. Four years later, the boy's father transposes his grief into his masterpiece—titled with a common variant of his son's name—in which the father dies, and the son lives to avenge him. JAMES SHAPIRO, one of the most celebrated Shakespeare scholars writing today, has an extraordinary understanding of Shakespeare's work. These two brilliant authors, coming from different sides of the literary house, will join SVWC Literary Director JOHN BURNHAM SCHWARTZ for a passionate and wideranging conversation about how and why Shakespeare, arguably more than any writer in history, matters today.

JOHN VAILLANT: ECOLOGICAL STORIES

All three of JOHN VAILLANT's award-winning, nonfiction books are narratively riveting stories that take us directly into one of the most morally urgent and consequential questions of our time: namely, how we negotiate the intensifying collisions between human ambition and the natural world. The Golden Spruce told the story of an anti-logger who took a drastic measure: felling a tree sacred to the Haida people to raise awareness about the dangers of cutting down many more trees elsewhere. The Tiger followed a hunt for a man-eater in the frozen wastes of the Russian taiga. Whereas these earlier books were about finding an accommodation with nature, Fire Weather is about what happens when none can be found. Vaillant will talk about these and other ecological stories from his fascinating career.
